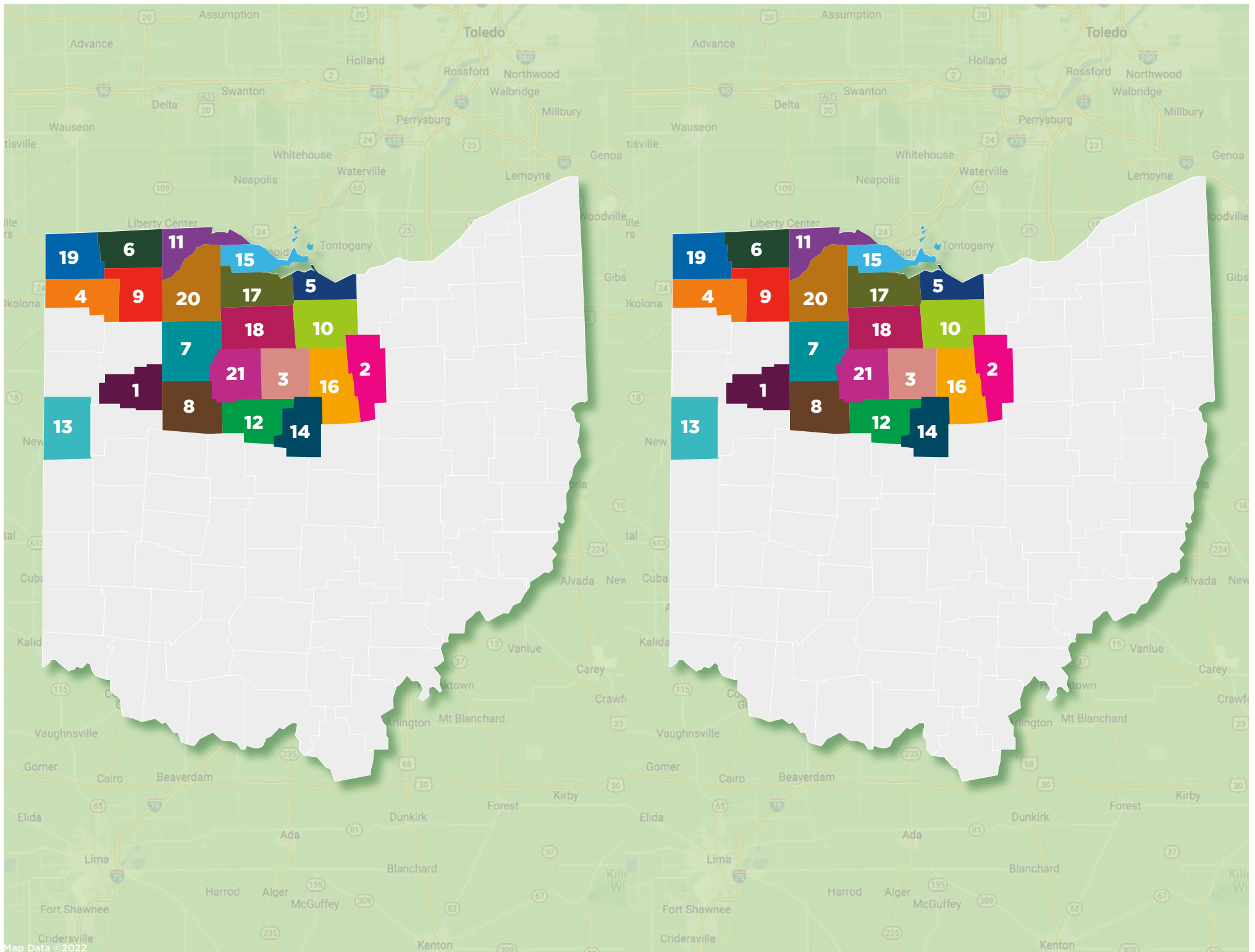

From folk heroes to famous inventors, the Mohican area's past is full of colorful characters & amazing stories: inventors who revolutionized the way we live, entertainers who wowed royalty, explorers who braved the frontier, & industries that became icons of their time. The CRF Museum tells these stories & more through period displays interactive exhibits also operates the historic Workman Cabin, built in 1838 in Central Park. The cabin was home to Morgan & Jerutia Workman & their 12 children, serving not only as their residence but also a wayward inn & a Dunkard church.

The museum, a historic home built in 1853 for Isaac Beery & his wife, Leefe Fowler, was donated to the Wyandot County Historical Society by their grandson, former Sears, Roebuck & Co. President and C.E.O. Fowler Beery McConnell, and his wife, Lucille in June 1962. Decorated to illustrate the late 1800s, it holds many artifacts & documents relating to the history of Wyandot County, its inhabitants, businesses, famous residents, & the Wyandotte Nations citizens. The property also includes the one-room Maple Grove Schoolhouse, Outhouse, & Pennsylvania Railroad Shack.

Colonel Joseph McCutchen built the Overland Inn, located in McCutchenville, Ohio, in 1829. The structure served as a stagecoach stop, hotel & an apartment building. It was purchased by the Wyandot County Archaeological & Historical Society in 1964, restored to its stagecoach era appearance & dedicated in 1967. Located along SR 53 (formerly the Plank Road or Harrison Trail), it is one of only two stagecoach inns remaining in their original location in the state of Ohio. It is furnished with antiques donated by Wyandot County residents & retains the original reception & bar room where travelers such as Charles Dickens & General William Henry Harrison visited.

The Edison Birthplace Museum was opened by his wife, Mina, & his daughter, Madeleine, as a tribute to the humble beginnings of a great man. It features a collection of rare Edisonia, including examples of many of Edison's early inventions, documents, & family mementos. Maintained by the Edison Birthplace Association, Inc., this National Historic Site is the only Edison site to have family involved including great-grandchildren, a great-great-great-great niece on the Board & a great-great-great nephew as President.

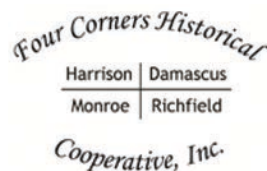

The addition to the original building was dedicated April 2, 1995. A bond levy passed in 2014 & renovations began in 2015 to update & redesign the Willard Memorial Library.

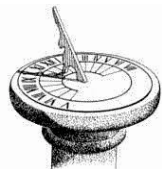

The Fallen Timbers Battlefield National Historic Site is the serene & pristine site of one of the top three battlefields in the United States, saved from development by preservation efforts

spearheaded by the Fallen Timbers Battlefield Preservation Commission. In the 1794 Fallen Timbers Campaign, General Anthony Wayne led the U.S. Legion, Kentucky Militia & Choctaw & Chickasaw Tribes against a Native confederation of tribes led by Chiefs Blue Jacket, Little Turtle & Tarhe, among others, & British/Canadian Militia. The final battle took place near present-day Maumee, OH on Aug. 20, 1794, & the Legion forces prevailed, leading to the signing of the Treaty of Greenville & bringing peace to the Ohio frontier that would last for over a decade.

The Fort Miamis National Historic Site is the location of a British fort built on the banks of the Maumee River just prior to the Battle of Fallen Timbers in August 1794. The fort was besieged

The Fort was also instrumental to British/Native forces in the siege of Fort Meigs during the War of 1812. Portions of the earthworks that supported the fort are still present today.

Fort Recovery is the site of 2 remarkable Northwest Indian War battles: the 1791 victory of 9 American Indian tribes, led by Mihšihkinaahkwa (Little Turtle, Miami) and Weyapiersenwah (Blue Jacket, Shawnee) over General Arthur St. Clair's forces; & the 1794 victory of General Anthony Wayne's army over a larger alliance of American Indian tribes. These events were pivotal in setting the stage for the 1795 Treaty of Greenville, after which American Indians relinquished most of their land holdings in Ohio. And set the course for the 1830 Indian Removal Act, which forcibly removed American Indians from their Ohio homelands.
